Carsten L. Wilke (CEU Medieval Studies / Religious Studies)

From Lamentation to Mourning in the Hebrew Bible

This lecture draws on approaches from anthropology and redaction criticism for a new study of the contrasting patterns of lamentation that are described in the Hebrew Bible. Part of the biblical corpus evokes customs of praying and fasting that resemble later Jewish mourning, while the pre-exilic prophets extol the tumultuous rituals of self-defilement that ancient Mediterraneans, led by female wailers, used to perform in reaction to bereavement or in fear of death, siege, and exile. The vanishing of these rites indicates historical processes of social discipline and the marginalization of women, but ritual communities did in fact coexist. It will finally be argued that the controversial traditions were quite systematically expurgated and euphemized in the Deuteronomistic history.

Carsten L. Wilke (PhD Cologne, 1994) is Professor at the History and Medieval Studies Departments of Central European University, where he directs the Center for Religious Studies. He has authored studies on the religious history of European Jewry with focus areas in Jewish-Christian controversy, Iberian crypto-Judaism, and the modern history of the rabbinate. His latest publications include the monographs *The Marrakesh Dialogues: A Gospel Critique and Jewish Apology from the Spanish Renaissance* (Brill, 2014), *Histoire des juifs portugais* (Chandeigne, 2nd ed., 2015), and *Farewell to Shulamit: Spatial and Social Diversity in the Song of Songs* (De Gruyter, 2017), as well as the collective volume *Modern Jewish Scholarship in Hungary: The "Science of Judaism" between East and West*, co-edited with Tamás Turán (De Gruyter, 2016).
